



Alternative Entry Pathways

2011

The University of Notre Dame Australia places great value on applicants coming to the university through alternative entry pathways.

Students who have proceeded through the Notre Dame admission process, but have not been offered a place in their nominated course, are encouraged to consider an alternative entry pathway.

Successful completion of one of the following programs/methods will allow prospective students to apply for entry to their course of choice. Prospective students should note that completion of an alternative entry pathway does not guarantee entry into a course at Notre Dame.

The following list outlines the University's preferred alternative entry pathways for its undergraduate courses. Prospective students wishing to undertake another method of alternative entry should check with the University to confirm that it will meet minimum entry requirements.

Bachelor of Exercise and Sport Science, Bachelor of Health and Physical Education, Bachelor of Preventive Health, Bachelor of Outdoor Recreation

- Notre Dame Tertiary Enabling Program – a full time, thirteen week (one semester) alternative entry program. Runs each semester.
- Repeat or mature-age TEE.
- Special Tertiary Admissions Test (for applicants over 20 years of age): Overall score of 145 and a Written English score of 145 required.
- TAFE or other RTO Certificate IV in Sport (Development), Sport and Recreation, Teacher Assistant, Diploma of Outdoor Recreation or other relevant area.

Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Arts (Politics and Journalism), Bachelor of Communications, Bachelor of Theology, Bachelor of Science

- Notre Dame Tertiary Enabling Program – a full time, thirteen week (one semester) alternative entry program. Runs each semester.
- Repeat or mature-age TEE.
- Special Tertiary Admissions Test (for applicants over 20 years of age): Overall score of 145 and Written English score of 145 required.
- TAFE or other RTO Certificate IV in a relevant area.

Bachelor of Behavioural Science, Bachelor of Counselling

- Notre Dame Tertiary Enabling Program – a full time, thirteen week (one semester) alternative entry program. Runs each semester.
- Repeat or mature-age TEE.
- Special Tertiary Admissions Test (for applicants over 20 years of age): Overall score of 145 required.
- TAFE or other RTO Certificate IV in Aged Care Work, Alcohol and other Drugs Work, Community Services or other relevant area.

Bachelor of Biomedical Science

- Notre Dame Tertiary Enabling Program – a full time, thirteen week (one semester) alternative entry program. Runs each semester.
- Repeat or mature-age TEE.
- Special Tertiary Admissions Test (for applicants over 20 years of age): Overall score of 150 and Written English score of 145 required.
- TAFE or other RTO Certificate IV in an area relevant to Health Sciences.

Bachelor of Commerce, Bachelor of Human Resource Management, Bachelor of Marketing and Public Relations, Bachelor of Sport and Recreation Management

- Notre Dame Tertiary Enabling Program – a full time, thirteen week (one semester) alternative entry program. Runs each semester.
- Repeat or mature-age TEE.
- Special Tertiary Admissions Test (for applicants over 20 years of age): Overall score of 145 and Written English score of 145 required.
- TAFE or other RTO Certificate IV in an area relevant to Business and Commerce.

Bachelor of Education

- Notre Dame Tertiary Enabling Program – a full time, thirteen week (one semester) alternative entry program. Runs each semester.

Please note that this is a pathway for Early Childhood and Primary Education, not Secondary.

- Notre Dame Teacher Assistant Course.

- Repeat or mature-age TEE
- Special Tertiary Admissions Tests (for applicants over 20 years of age): Overall score of 145 and Written English score of 145 required.
- TAFE or other RTO Certificate IV in an area relevant to Education.

Bachelor of Laws

- One year of strong performance in the Notre Dame Bachelor of Arts (Major: Legal Studies) or other relevant undergraduate course taken at Notre Dame or an alternative University.
- Repeat or mature-age TEE – 4 subject minimum.

Bachelor of Nursing

- Notre Dame Tertiary Enabling Program – a full time, thirteen week (one semester) alternative entry program. Runs each semester.
- Repeat or mature-age TEE.
- Special Tertiary Admissions Test (for applicants over 20 years of age): Overall score of 150 and Written English score of 145 required.
- TAFE or other RTO Certificate IV in Community Services (Aged Care Nursing), Bridging into Nursing, Enrolled Nursing, or other relevant area.

Bachelor of Physiotherapy

- One year of strong performance in the Bachelor of Biomedical Science, Bachelor of Exercise and Sport Science or other relevant undergraduate course taken at Notre Dame or an alternative University.
- Repeat or mature-age TEE – 4 subject minimum (require TEE science background).

STUDIES AT TAFE

Students who have successfully completed a Certificate IV level qualification in a relevant area at TAFE are considered to have met minimum entry requirements for entry into most courses at The University of Notre Dame Australia.

Successful completion of one year of a Diploma, Associate Diploma or Advanced Diploma at TAFE also fulfils minimum entry requirements and candidates may be eligible for Advance Standing.

Prospective Students should contact TAFE directly for further details of availability of courses and application deadlines.

OTHER UNIVERSITY PROGRAMS

Other WA universities offer pathways into study at each particular institution. Notre Dame will consider applicants with such qualifications on an individual basis.

SPECIAL TERTIARY ADMISSIONS TEST (STAT)

Applicants who are 20 years of age on or before March 1 of the year they are due to commence University study are eligible to sit the STAT and use the results to meet minimum entry requirements at Notre Dame.

The STAT is run by TISC (Tertiary Institutions Service Centre).

REPEAT TEE

Students who have missed out on the required Year 12 results to gain entry into their course of choice can consider repeating the TEE. Normal school leaver admission requirements apply.
