University Objects and History

The **Objects** of The University of Notre Dame Australia are set out in the University's enabling **Act of Parliament**. They are:

- a) The provision of university education within a context of Catholic faith and values and
- b) The provision of an excellent standard of –
 - i) Teaching, scholarship and research
 - ii) Training for the professions and
 - iii) Pastoral care for its students

Notre Dame was founded by an Act of Parliament in 1989. It enrolled its first students on its Fremantle Campus in 1992. Its founding partner was the University of Notre Dame in the United States.

A second Campus was opened in Broome in 1994. In 2006, at the invitation of the Archbishop of Sydney, George Cardinal Pell, the University opened its third Campus in Sydney.

From small beginnings, this thriving University now has over 7,000 students enrolled on its three Campuses.

Notre Dame specialises in undergraduate education and training for the professions. It aims to be one of the best Catholic universities in the world.

Notre Dame Campuses

The Fremantle Campus

The Fremantle Campus is located in the 19th century West End precinct of this port city. It operates in carefully restored former warehouse and commercial heritage buildings, which have produced a town university of great character. The University has placed great emphasis on ensuring that its physical facilities are beautiful and of high standards. This is very much part of the tradition of Catholic higher education which it follows.

The Broome Campus

The Broome Campus is a relatively small operation, offering special courses which support the educational advancement of Aboriginal people. The prime mission of the Broome Campus is to be an effective force for reconciliation among Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal Australians. The Broome Campus has residential facilities to support its academic and social justice agenda. Broome Campus offers units in Aboriginal studies, Nursing and Education.

The Sydney Campus

Notre Dame's Sydney Campus is based on two sites, in Broadway and in Darlinghurst.

The Broadway Campus opened in 2006, and comprises the University's Schools of Arts and Sciences, Business, Education, Law and Philosophy and Theology. These Schools operate in the beautiful and restored former St Benedict's School buildings, originally erected in the 1850's and 1870's as one of the young Catholic Church's main centres in Sydney.

The Darlinghurst Campus opened in February 2008 and contains the University's School of Medicine and School of Nursing. This Campus has a capacity for about 1,000 students. It comprises yet another set of historic church and school buildings of great beauty which were the Sacred Heart parish and which have been restored and adapted to their modern university use. They are in Oxford Street, adjacent to the University's major health partner, the outstanding St Vincent's Public and Private Hospital, where many of our Medical and Nursing students will receive their training.

Most students choose to study abroad at Notre Dame for one semester; however, it is possible for a student to spend a full year at Notre Dame.

Study Abroad Certificates

These academic certificates are designed for the study abroad student. They are ideal for students wishing to specialise in a specific area of study, and they recognise completion of a semester's focused academic work.

Certificate in International Studies (Semester 1 & 2) Fremantle and Sydney Campus

This certificate is awarded to students who successfully complete their approved program of study, consisting of at least 5 units.

Certificate in Asia Pacific Studies (Semester 1 only) Fremantle Campus only

The Certificate in Asia Pacific Studies provides students with an opportunity to engage in an in-depth academic study of the interaction between the unique histories, political systems, cultures and peoples of the Asia Pacific region.

Certificate in Asia Pacific Business (Semester 2 only) Fremantle Campus only

The Certificate in Asia Pacific Business is a special program especially designed for Business majors. Students examine the importance of the Asia-Pacific region in the context of the global economy.

The Certificate in Australasian Ecology (Semesters 1 & 2) Fremantle Campus only

This Certificate is designed to provide students with the opportunity to explore Australasian environments and ecology in detail. Australia is characterised by some very unique habitats, flora and fauna. Field trips to sites of interest are an integral part of this course of study.

Unique Experiences & Field Trips (Fremantle Campus)

A special feature of the study abroad academic program each semester at Notre Dame Fremantle Campus, are the courses which provide a unique experience of Australian social and physical environments. Field trips add value to the academic program, giving students the opportunity to go beyond the classroom and gain first-hand knowledge and experience.

Australian History & Society:

This course includes a field trip to the Kimberley region of north Western Australia. During this field trip students meet members of a local Aboriginal community, learn about their culture, and explore the Australian outback.

Business in Asia:

Especially designed for Business majors, this course includes a trip to an Asian location. Students are exposed to Asian culture and business methods. Organizations visited in the past have included stock broking firms, industrial and construction firms.

Environmental Ecology and History of the South Coast:

This is an Environmental Science course which includes lecture time on campus in Fremantle and eleven days sailing on board the ST Leeuwin II – a three-masted tall sailing ship, around the West Australian Coastline.

Summer in Australia

Summer in Fremantle

Fremantle Campus

This is an excellent opportunity to experience the Australian summer, and enrol in the popular class 'Environmental Ecology and History of the South Coast'.

The South Coast of Western Australia is one of the world's biodiversity hotspots, and students are exposed to a number of marine and terrestrial environments, and environmental management issues. While on board the Leeuwin, students undertake their own field research projects and participate in all aspects of sailing the ship. This is a unique and extremely exciting way to see a part of Australia that very few others are privileged enough to visit.



Summer in Sydney

Sydney is a fabulous place to be in summer. Students can experience the world-famous Bondi Beach, go sailing on Sydney Harbour or take a book and relax on the quiet and pristine Northern Beaches. There is always the Sydney Harbour Bridge climb or, for the less adventurous students can take a walking tour of Sydney being sure to visit the Rocks, The Sydney Opera House and the Royal Botanical Gardens.

Sydney provides two open air cinemas during the summer months – one right on Sydney Harbour and one in beautiful Centennial Park. Students can take a picnic and relax, watching a movie under the stars.

Accommodation

Study Abroad Program students may have the opportunity to stay in student residence halls on the Fremantle campus. These residential buildings blend architecturally with the heart of historic Fremantle.

Fremantle Campus

The accommodation facilities in Fremantle on campus provide students with a furnished single or shared room, including a bed, closet, desk and chair. Bed linen is also provided.

Each residence has its own computer laboratory with 24 hour internet access.

Students are responsible for laundering their own clothes, however, University contractors launder the bed linen on a regular basis. Coin-operated washing machines and dryers are available for the students' use.

Shared bathroom and kitchen facilities are provided and meals are self-catered.

Residential Supervisors are based in each residence. They are generally older students who are available for advice or support. The Residential Supervisors run a program of activities, events and excursions throughout the semester to add value to the Study Abroad experience. These residences are subject to availability.

Home Stay

Students from some study abroad programs will have the opportunity to live in an Australian family for the duration of their study abroad semester. These home stays provide an ideal opportunity to integrate into Australian life and to develop a far greater appreciation of local culture. Students placed in Australian homes will be given details well before arrival.

Sydney Campus

There is no accommodation on campus however there are staff willing to assist with helping students find accommodation close to the campus. There is the option of living with an Australian family in a homestay environment or living in student accommodation close to the campus.

Student Life

At a small university such as Notre Dame, students are part of the community and take part in a huge range of extra-curricular activities available on campus in both Fremantle and Sydney. The Student Life Office and the Student Association encourage the participation of students in all aspects of university life through a range of student activities and services.

Student Life Office

The Student Life Office is dedicated to ensuring that students get the most out of their time at Notre Dame. Extensive arrays of extra-curricular activities are available on each campus. The Student Life Office and the Student Association aim to enhance the participation of students in all aspects of university life through the provision of a range of student services.

Notre Dame Student Association

The Notre Dame Student Association coordinates the University's student clubs and groups which provide an avenue for social and personal development, as well as fostering a sense of community. The Student Association aims to support the needs of Notre Dame students. The Association liaises directly with student groups to ensure that student rights are protected and concerns are appropriately addressed.

Services that are available through The Student Life office include:

■ Sport and Recreation

The Student Life Office organises teams in a variety of local sporting competitions at a social, intervarsity, state, national and international level.

■ Mentor Program

The Student Life Office coordinates a group of current students to assist with the transition of new students by giving advice on university life, showing a friendly face and providing new students with an opportunity to meet other people around campus.

■ Academic Support Program

The Student Life Office assists in running the Academic Support Program for students who feel they need some extra help adjusting to academic standards. Academic support is offered across several areas including skills workshops in academic writing, oral presentations and IT for academic purposes.

■ Volunteering

The Student Life Office provides students the opportunity to engage with community projects and make a difference, whether it is on campus or in the local community.

■ Counselling

The University provides a confidential and professional counselling service to assist students who are in need of counselling in relation to personal issues.

■ Equity Support

There are various support services available at the University to students with special needs. The Equity Liaison Officer can assist students with a disability or a medical condition who may require assistance with individual academic arrangements.

■ Campus Ministry

Campus Ministry at the University includes a Chaplain and a Campus Minister who are available for student consultation or an informal visit. Campus Ministry coordinates campus Masses, retreats and special interest programs to meet the needs of staff and students.
